Reflection is a key step in this process and helps students make the connection between classroom and community learning. Taking time to analyze the scope of the service-learning experience fosters an understanding of how each person can make a difference, affect positive change, and develop leadership skills that strengthen community.

Some of the courses offered at MSU include service-learning components. Service learning takes time, thought, attention and commitment. Students who participate in service-learning benefit

Service-learning...

- Increases understanding of class topics.
- Provides hands-on experience that could lead to internships or career opportunities.
- Provides an opportunity to explore values and beliefs.
- Gives you an opportunity to act on what you believe is right.
- Helps develop critical thinking and problem-solving skills.
- Promotes growth in your understanding of diverse cultures and communities.
- Inspires learning about social issues, their causes and how to affect change.
- Helps identify your strengths, skills and talents while applying them in real world settings.
- Develops and enhances communication, collaboration, and leadership skills.
- Tests your skills, interests, and values in a potential career path, and helps you learn more about a field that interests you.
- Connects you with professionals and community members with whom you will learn.
- Supports growth of a professional network of people you might connect with again later for jobs or internships.
- Satisfies your urge toward public service or civic participation.

Now that you are up to speed are you ready to get started? If the answer is yes, the Office of Community Engagement is available to introduce you to on and off campus service-learning experiences. Two projects that operate on campus are known as Campus Kitchen and Mavericks READ! Campus Kitchen develops student leadership in support of individuals throughout the Mankato area who are managing food insecurity. Minnesota State Mankato students assist in recovering nutritious, delicious food from area restaurants that is repackaged and delivered to the homes of our neighbors.

Mavericks READ supports area elementary aged children in the development of literacy skills and a love for reading. This is accomplished by hosting reading activities and events, and by cultivating school–based mentoring relationships with Minnesota State Mankato students.
