First Fridays Movie & Conversation

A monthly movie and conversation will be hosted on **First Friday** afternoons at **1:00 p.m.** at Pathstone Latitude, 115 Rogers Street, Mankato.

Upcoming Movies:

October 17th (Note: Not the First Friday): ***The Tree of Life*** (2011) 2h 19m

A visually stunning philosophical drama directed by Terrence Malick, exploring the cosmic and personal journey of life through the lens of one family's experiences in 1950s Texas. The film centers on Jack, a man reflecting on his childhood, his complicated relationship with his strict father, and the loss of innocence, while also contemplating the broader themes of existence, creation, and faith. With its stunning visuals and meditative narrative, *The Tree of Life* is a contemplative exploration of life's meaning, blending the intimate with the universal. Starring Brad Pitt, Jessica Chastain and Sean Penn.

November 7th: *The Last Duel* (2021) 2h 32m

Historical drama directed by Ridley Scott, based on true events from medieval France, revolving around the final sanctioned duel between knights Jean de Carrouges and Jacques Le Gris. The film explores themes of honor, betrayal, and the complexities of truth through the differing perspectives of the three main characters, including Carrouges' wife, Marguerite, who becomes central to the conflict. With its gripping narrative and strong performances, particularly from Matt Damon, Adam Driver, and Jodie Comer, *The Last Duel* delves into the consequences of power and the struggle for justice in a patriarchal society.

December 5th: *Jo Jo Rabbit* (2014) 1h 48m

A satirical comedy-drama directed by Taika Waititi, set in Nazi Germany and following a young boy named Johannes "Jojo" Betzler, an enthusiastic member of the Hitler Youth. Jojo's world is turned upside down when he discovers that his mother (Scarlett Johansson) is hiding a Jewish girl, Elsa, in their home, leading him to question his beliefs and the ideology he has been raised to embrace. Blending humor with poignant moments, the film explores themes of love, acceptance, and the absurdity of hatred, ultimately highlighting the power of empathy and understanding.

December 19: *A Boy Called Christmas* (2021) 1h 46m

A family fantasy film directed by Gil Kenan, based on the book by Matt Haig. The story follows a young boy named Nikolas, who sets off on a magical journey to find his father, who is on a quest to discover the fabled village of Elfhelm. Along the way, Nikolas encounters various fantastical creatures and learns valuable lessons about hope, kindness, and the true spirit of Christmas, making it a heartwarming tale for audiences of all ages.

MSU Mankato Play: *The Women of Troy*



Members and their guests are invited to the classic, anti-war Greek play, the Women of Troy. This adaptation was first presented by Bethany Lutheran College in 2017. While this is not a free event, MSU has generously offered us discounted tickets at a cost of \$10 per ticket. MSU describes the play as: "A timeless Greek tragedy, Euripides' *The Women of Troy* is a gripping and haunting portrayal of the human cost of war, told through the eyes of the women left behind. In the wake of Troy's destruction, the surviving Trojan women face exile and unimaginable loss. Stripped of power but not of dignity, they confront their fate with courage, defiance and heartbreaking humanity.

The Tudors & Why They Still Matter (The History of England Part 1)

Number of Sessions: 14. Note: It's alright if you must miss some.

Cost: Free for Gold members; \$30 for Silver members

Step into the thrilling world of the Tudor dynasty — a period of power, passion, and profound transformation that reshaped England and echoes through history to this day. In this dynamic course, you'll explore the rise of the Tudors, from Henry VIII's dramatic break with Rome to Elizabeth I's brilliant leadership and the defeat of the Spanish Armada. Along the way, you'll meet unforgettable characters and dive into scandalous stories of ambition, betrayal, intrigue, and romance. Uncover how sweeping changes in religion, politics, society, and the arts laid the groundwork for England's emergence as a global power — and how the seeds of modern America, constitutional government, and global exploration were sown in this unforgettable era. With all its glory and controversy, the Tudor age offers a captivating lens through which to understand the modern world.

The centerpiece of this course will be 27 lectures (30-minute each) from the Great Courses course "History of England from the Tudors to the Stuarts" by Professor Robert Bucholz. This course has 195 reviews of which 90% are 5 Stars and 6% are 4 Stars. A complete description, list of lectures and a trailer for the course can be found [here](#). The course lectures will be supplemented by host-curated material from YouTube, including videos on daily life, science and superstitions, and the music, art and literature of the Tudor period. We will also watch a theatrical film (to be determined) on the Tudor period.

Presenter: Steve Gilbert - Retired psychologist Steve Gilbert has read widely in British history. He has previously led courses for Lifelong Learners on Vincent Van Gogh, The Beatles, The History of Baseball, and How to Appreciate Great Movies. He plans to offer the second half of this course, on the Stuarts, in the Fall of 2026.

#2: Monday, October 20th, 2 – 4 p.m. – Growing Old Does Not Have to Mean Growing Weak

This talk debunks the commonly believed notion that we shouldn't be lifting heavy things as we age. We will go into detail on all the benefits of strength training as well as how to better gauge the intensity of your workouts. We will touch on some of the things that happen to our bodies as we get older and how a good strength training regimen can help us age "gracefully" to keep us as active as possible through the entirety of life.

Presenter: Jake Nienow, DPT, Mankato Clinic. A Mapleton native, Jake Nienow began his career with the Mankato Clinic right after earning his Doctorate in Physical Therapy. He has been practicing for eight years, treating a wide range of orthopedic injuries with a special focus on athletes of all ages. Jake's primary goal as a physical therapist is to help people return to the activities that bring them joy-and if that includes lifting some heavy weights along the way, even better. Outside the clinic, Jake enjoys time with his wonderful family and staying active himself, living the advice he gives to his patients.

#3: Thursday, October 30th, *10 a.m. – 12 p.m. — Not the Camilla We Knew: One Woman's Life from Small-town America to the Symbionese Liberation Army # (Re-Scheduled from Feb 11th & May 20th)

This presentation unravels the mystery of how an ordinary Minnesota girl came to be, briefly, one of the most wanted domestic terrorists in the United States. Behind every act of domestic terrorism there is someone's child, an average American whose life took a radical turn for reasons that often remain mysterious. Camilla Hall is a case in point: a pastor's daughter from small-town Minnesota who eventually joined the ranks of radicals like Sara Jane Olson (aka Kathleen Soliah) in the notorious Symbionese Liberation Army before dying in a shootout with Los Angeles Police in May 1974. How could a "good girl" like Camilla become one of the most wanted domestic terrorists in the United States? Rachael Hanel tells her story here, revealing both the deep humanity and the extraordinary circumstances of Camilla Hall's life. Camilla's childhood in a tight-knit religious family was marred by loss and grief as, one after another, her three siblings died. Her path from her Minnesota home to her final, radical SLA family featured years as an artist and activist—in welfare offices, political campaigns, union organizing, culminating in a love affair that would be her introduction to the SLA. Through in-depth research and extensive interviews, Hanel pieces together Camilla's bewildering transformation from a "gentle, zaftig, arty, otherworldly" young woman (as one observer remarked), working for social change within the system, into a gun-wielding criminal involved in the kidnapping of Patty Hearst.

During this time of mounting unrest and violence, Camilla Hall's story is of urgent interest for what it reveals about the forces of radicalization. But as Hanel ventures ever further into Camilla's past, searching out the critical points where character and cause might intersect, her book becomes an intriguing, disturbing, and ultimately deeply moving journey into the dark side of America's promise.

Presenter: Rachael Hanel is a Professor of Creative Writing at MSUM and the author of "Not the Camilla We Knew: One Woman's Life from Small-town America to the Symbionese Liberation Army", University of Minnesota Press, 2022.

#4: Thursday, November 13th, 2 - 4 p.m. — Famous Trials: The T. Eugene Thompson Murder Trial

On March 6, 1963, Mrs. Harry Nelson was in her kitchen in St. Paul. At 9:00 a.m. the doorbell rang. Nelson answered the door to see a woman covered in blood and in a bathrobe holding her throat. So began the most famous murder trial in St. Paul and possibly Minnesota. The woman was Carol Thompson, married to prominent St. Paul attorney T. Eugene Thompson. The investigation led to a conspiracy on the part of T. Eugene to arrange for the murder of Carol. This presentation discusses the investigation and trial of Thompson.

Presenter: James Fleming practiced law in Minnesota for 35 years before his recent retirement, 22 of those years as a public defender. He served as the chief public defender for the 15 counties of the Fifth Judicial District in southwest Minnesota, based in Mankato, and later for the Second Judicial District (Ramsey County).

#5: Friday, November 21st, *10 a.m. - 12 p.m. – The End of Night: Searching for Darkness in an Age of Artificial Light

A starry night is one of nature's most magical wonders. Yet in our artificially lit world, most of us no longer experience true darkness. In this talk based on his critically acclaimed book THE END OF NIGHT, Paul Bogard seeks to restore our awareness of the spectacularly primal, wildly dark night sky and how it has influenced the human experience across everything from science to art. Using a blend of personal narrative, natural history, science, and astronomy, Bogard shares the importance of darkness—what we've lost, what we still have, and what we might regain—and the simple ways we can reduce the brightness of our nights tonight.

Presenter: Paul Bogard is an American author and dark sky advocate. A native Minnesotan, Bogard grew up exploring the forest and watching the stars near a lake in the northern part of the state. He has lived and taught in New Mexico, Nevada, Wisconsin, North Carolina, and Virginia. He is currently an associate professor of English at Hamline University. He is the author of [The End of Night: Searching for Natural Darkness in an Age of Artificial Light](#) (Little, Brown, 2013), [What If Night?](#) (Keystone Canyon Press, 2020), and [To Know a Starry Night](#) (University of Nevada Press, 2021).
